


History of Hymns

"Lead, Kindly Light" written by John Henry Newman

John Henry Newman (21 February 1801 - 11 August 1890) was born in London and was a prominent academic, theologian, philosopher, historian, writer and poet. At the age of 15, in his last year of school, he converted to Evangelical Christianity. He went on to study at Trinity College, Oxford and in 1825 was ordained as a Church of England priest in Christ Church Cathedral by the Bishop of Oxford. He had often been outspoken about the Roman Catholic church. frequently criticising its doctrines but over a period of years his attitude changed and in 1843 he preached his last Anglican sermon before converting to Catholicism with great personal consequences, suffering broken relationships with family and friends. In 1846 he went to Rome and was ordained a priest before returning to England as an oratorian.

Over the following years he became very prominent in the promotion of the Catholic faith. In 1854, at the request of Irish Catholic bishops, Newman went to Dublin as rector and founder of the newly established Catholic University of Ireland, now University College Dublin, retiring from the role after four years. In 1879 Newman was elevated to the rank of cardinal by Pope Leo XIII.

In 1991, many years after his death, Newman was proclaimed venerable by Pope John Paul II after a thorough examination of his life and work. He was beatified in 2010 by Pope Benedict XVI and canonised in 2019 by Pope Francis in a ceremony in St Peter's Square, Rome, attended by King Charles III, then Prince of Wales.


Like many popular hymns the words of "Lead, Kindly Light" were first written as a poem with a musical setting being added some time later. The original poem was entitled 'the Pillar of the

History of Hymns continued

Cloud' and it was written by John Henry Newman in 1833 on a sea voyage from Palermo in Sicily, Italy to Marseille in France. Newman, then a Church of England priest, had been ill during his visit to Italy and was unable to travel for a time. He was desperate to get back to England and as soon as he was well enough to travel he boarded an orange boat bound for Marseille. Frustratingly the boat was becalmed for a week in the Strait of Boniface, between the islands of Corsica and Sardinia, and it was then that he wrote the words of "Lead. Kindly Light", inspired by his recent illness and his remoteness from home at the time. He was seeking spiritual guidance and direction from God in

his mission in the Anglican church and he was stating his unquestioning faith in God to show him the path forward.

The first musical setting was published in 1868, set to the tune *Lux Benigna*, written by John Bacchus Dykes, an English clergyman and hymn writer. Newman himself credited the subsequent popularity of the hymn to Dykes' tune. Other musical settings have included *Bonifacio* by David Evans, *Alberta* by William Henry Harris which he composed on a train crossing of Canada, *Sandon* by Charles H. Purday and Arthur Sullivan's *Lux in Tenebris*. *Lux Benigna* and *Sandon* are the two versions published in the current Church of Ireland hymnal.



There has been a number of notable occasions when it is known that the hymn was sung.

In a dreadful mining disaster in a colliery in Durham in 1909, 168 men and boys died following two underground explosions. Some 26 men sat in total darkness in a pocket of clean air awaiting rescue when one started humming the tune of the hymn, presumably to keep his and the others' spirits up, and in no time the other miners joined in singing the words. These 26 men were rescued 14 hours later.

Shortly before the R.M.S. 'Titanic' struck the iceberg on 14 April 1912 a soloist, Marion Wright, sang Lead, Kindly Light in a hymn singing gathering led by Rev. Ernest C. Carter. Instigated by Noëlle, Countess of Rothes, she and the other passengers in one of the lifeboats sang the hymn when the rescue ship 'Carpathia' was sighted the following morning.

During the German occupation of the Netherlands during World War 2 members of a Dutch Christian family were helping Jewish refugees escape from the Nazis. Two sisters in the family were Corrie and Betsie ten Boom and they and their family were also very active in the Dutch Resistance. Eventually an informant notified the Gestapo and they and many others were arrested. Eventually the sisters and other women were interned in Ravensbrück concentration camp, located north of Berlin, and they sang the hymn as they were taken to the camp. Betsie, like many other prisoners, died of illness. Bizarrely Corrie was released less than two weeks later seemingly due to a clerical error and she found out later that all the women of her age were executed in the gas chambers a week later. Following the war she wrote many books about her experiences and travelled widely as a public speaker promoting her important messages of forgiveness, hope, love, and salvation through the saving grace of Jesus Christ.

The hymn has been noted as being the favourite of a number of famous people including Mahatma Gandhi and Percy French. French died suddenly in January 1920 and was buried in St Luke's Parish Churchyard, Formby in Lancashire.

The following lines from the hymn are engraved on his headstone;

"So long thy power hath blessed me Sure it still will lead me on, O'er moor and fen, o'er crag and torrent; Till the night is gone."

He is risen!

Luke 24:44-47 The Death of Jesus

44 It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon, 45 for the sun stopped shining. And the curtain of the temple was torn in two. 46 Jesus called out with a loud voice, "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit." When he had said this, he breathed his last

Swan Rescue

Wardens and choir members arriving at church early on 4th February were surprised to see a mute swan sitting on the car park. Clearly this was very unusual behaviour for this beautiful bird so on carefully approaching it blood was noticed on its beak and side. It stood up with some difficulty and sat down again on the grass so it was obviously hurt in some way. A number of Northern Ireland Electricity Networks linesmen had also arrived in the car park checking out a reported fault and it didn't take long to realise that the two events were connected. On checking the electrical installation at the bottom of the church car park the linesmen discovered that there was a blown fuse on the overhead line feeding the nearby houses. The swan had probably collided with the conductors, shorting them together and blowing the fuse, before crash landing on the car park. A couple of phone calls were made and within 15 minutes a vet from Clare Veterinary Practice in Ballyclare arrived and, with the assistance of the NIE Networks linesmen, the bird was very gently prepared for transport to the surgery in Ballyclare. There the on-call vet gave the swan a thorough examination and some antibiotics and moved it to an enclosure to recover. The USPCA was contacted and the swan was collected on Monday morning and taken to its specialist

wildlife facility in Newry. (The swan had a ring on its right leg and in doing a little research it was discovered that the convention is to place a ring on the right leg of a male and on the left leg of a female). In Newry the cob's minor injuries were tended to and on 14th February, when the staff were satisfied it had healed and was ready for the wild once again, they took him to north Woodburn reservoir where they released him into the water. Given that the reservoir had no other swans it was no surprise that he had disappeared two days later. Sincere thanks must go to everyone who helped with this rescue which happily had a good outcome.









Litter Pick


Following the release of the injured swan it was noted how much litter was scattered around the north Woodburn reservoir and a decision was made to return to it to tidy the area up. A team of seven hardy individuals braved the cold weather and the occasional shower of rain and sleet and spent a few hours walking round the reservoir and the surrounding area picking up all manner of litter from beer cans. bottles and discarded fishing line to a croc (not the reptilian variety!) and a discarded collapsible picnic chair! There was also a lot of dog dirt lying around on the paths and the grass areas but it had to stay. Some 'responsible' dog owners had made life easier by putting their pets' deposits in little bags and they had left them on the grass for collection! By the time the litter pickers had finished 14 bin-bags had been filled

with rubbish leaving the area much tidier. Sadly our society is such that no doubt in a few weeks the litter will be back. Still it was a very worthwhile exercise and removed a lot of potentially harmful material from the area. Thanks must go to everyone who took part and to Mid & East Antrim Borough Council for providing pickers and some bags.
