History of Hymns

On 12th November the nation will commemorate the fallen of the two World Wars and subsequent wars in remembrance services across the country led by King Charles III at the Cenotaph in London. The service there begins at precisely 10:36 a.m. with a programme of music known as "the Traditional Music", which has remained largely unchanged since 1930. This comprises a selection of National Airs and solemn music performed by the massed bands representing the four nations of the United Kingdom; the Band of the Grenadier Guards, Band of the Coldstream Guards, Band of the Scots Guards and the Band of the Irish Guards. The bands play music such as "The Minstrel Boy," "Men of Harlech," "The Skye Boat Song" and "Nimrod" from Elgar's Enigma Variations. One hymn that has long had an association with commemoration and is included in the Traditional Music is "O God. Our Help in Ages Past," a hymn written by Isaac Watts in 1708 and based on the 90th Psalm of the Book of Psalms.

Isaac Watts (17 July 1674 – 25 November 1748) was an English Congregational minister, hymn writer, theologian, and logician. He was a prolific and popular hymn writer and during his lifetime he penned some 750 hymns. His works include well known hymns such as "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross," "Joy to the World," as well as "Our God, Our Help in Ages Past." He is recognised as being the "Godfather of English Hymnody" with many of his hymns remaining in use today.

Watts displayed a skill for rhyme from an early age. As a boy he was once asked why he had his eyes open during prayers, to which he responded;

"A little mouse for want of stairs ran up a rope to say its prayers".

He received corporal punishment for this, to which he cried:

"O father, father, pity take And I will no more verses make".

The hymn originally consisted of nine verses but in modern usage the fourth, sixth and eighth verses are commonly omitted to leave a total of six. In 1738, John Wesley in his hymnal, *Psalms and Hymns*, changed the first line of the text from "Our God" to "O God". Both Watts' original text and Wesley's rewording remain in current use but the Church of Ireland hymnal uses Wesley's version.

The hymn was originally part of The Psalms of David Imitated in the Language of the New Testament, published by Watts in 1719. In this book he paraphrased in Christian verse the entire psalter with the exception of twelve Psalms which he felt were unsuited for Christian usage.

The hymn tune "St. Anne" to which the text is most often sung was composed by William Croft (1678 - 1727) in 1708 whilst he was the organist of St Anne's Church, Soho, hence the name of the tune. It first appeared in the Supplement to the *New Version of the Psalms, 6th edition* in 1708. It was originally intended to be used with a version of Psalm 62 and it was not until sometime later when set to Watts' text that the tune gained recognition.


The hymn has been sung on many notable historical occasions over the years including on the morning of Sunday, 14th April 1912 as the last hymn in a church service led by


Captain Edward J. Smith on board R.M.S. Titanic.

In 1941 it was sung on board HMS *Prince of Wales* at a religious service attended by Winston Churchill and Franklin D. Roosevelt as part of the conference creating the Atlantic Charter.

It was used again at Winston Churchill's state funeral in London in 1965.

It is also the school hymn for King Edward VI School, Southampton, which Isaac Watts himself attended, and as the peal of the nearby Southampton Civic Centre clock tower ringing out every four hours during the day at 8am, midday, 4pm and 8pm. The main bell in the bell tower is called the "Solent Chimes."





Kilbride Parish Church War Memorials

A number of men associated with the Parish of Kilbride answered their country's call during both the First and Second World Wars and enlisted into the armed forces. Most served in the British army or the Royal Navy but a number who had emigrated from the Kilbride district enlisted in their adopted countries. All served with honour but those listed opposite made the supreme sacrifice. Their names appear on a memorial inside the church as well as on the main memorial for this area in Ballyclare War Memorial Park. Information on individual servicemen can be found on the Commonwealth War Graves Commission website where details of each man is recorded, including date of death and place of burial, if known.

Many have no known graves but they are commemorated on collective memorials near where they fell.

The sacrifice these men made is remembered on Remembrance Sunday every year when a wreath of poppies is laid at the main memorial tablet inside the church. This tablet was unveiled on 14th December 1919 by Major General Sir William Adair KCB of Loughanmore.

The Shields

Have you ever sat in church and looked up at the wonderfully constructed roof of the building and wondered about the significance of the beautiful shields that are fixed to the roof timbers in the main body of the church and in the side chapel?

The thirteen shields are intended to represent various aspects of church life, and the church's connection with the community. Thus eight of the shields have ecclesiastical connections, three have civil connections, one has an industrial connection and one a personal and family connection. The idea for the shields was conceived by the late Rev. Roy Cox who was inspired by seeing a similar set of shields on the roof of a church in England. They are believed to be unique in Northern Ireland, if not on the entire island. The shields were manufactured locally, and painted by a parishioner, Gweneth Moore. Gweneth (sisterin-law of Ivan Topping) was a fabric designer by profession and Rev. Cox asked her to paint the various designs on to the bare aluminium shields. On completion they were installed by a parishioner and dedicated by Rev. Cox in 1988.

The connections are as follows:

Ecclesiastical – the coats of arms of the five Northern Ireland dioceses of the Church of Ireland (i.e. Connor, Armagh, Down & Dromore, Clogher and Derry & Raphoe); the Royal School of Church Music; and the emblems of St. Bride and St. Patrick.

Civil – the coats of arms of the city of Belfast, and the former Boroughs of Newtownabbey and Antrim, all of which have or have had a bearing on church life. The Parish is now of course situated in the Antrim & Newtownabbey Borough Council area.

Industrial – the arms of the Guild of Weavers & Millers, representing Doagh's long connection with spinning & weaving, and the linen trade. These industries had a substantial impact on the local community and parish, particularly in the 19th and early 20th centuries.

Personal & Family – the coat of arms of the Glentoran Family. The family has a long and honourable connection to the church with the present Lord Glentoran and his wife living locally at Drumadarragh House.
