Here is a way in which we can all play a valuable role in God's work. Will you take up the challenge?

Pray for our parish and all its people, that through our public worship we may be awakened to the wonder of God's love for us.

Pray that more and more of our people may see the necessity of weekly worship in church with their Christian brothers and sisters.

<u>Pray that our worship may constantly undergo renewal</u>, and that it may never become mere ceremonial observance.

<u>Pray for our Rector,</u> who has the cure of souls in the parish, and who requires your prayers in order to adequately perform his role.

Pray for all those who lead the worship, especially the Rector and David Holmes, that through their own preparation for the task, and in the way which they perform it, they may encourage all our people to worship in spirit and in truth.

WORKING HARD FOR SEVERAL CHARITIES


Here is Joshua, hard at work! He wanted to help the people in Ukraine, and has been making keyrings, crochet bracelets and painted flag pebbles to raise money.

EGO GORNER

EASY WAYS OF SAVING WATER

By thinking carefully about your water use in the home ands changing some water-wasting habits, it is easy to save water.

- O Vegetables and fruit should be washed in a bowl rather than under a running tap, and the leftover water can be used for watering house plants.
- O Use the minimum amount of water required when you boil water in saucepans and kettles; that way, you'll save energy as well as water.
- O Try not to leave the tap running while you brush your teeth, shave, or wash your hands, as this can waste up to 5 litres of water per minute.
- A 5 minute shower uses about a third of the water of a bath. But remember that power showers can use more water than a bath in less than 5 minutes!
- Old toilet cisterns can use as much as 9 litres of clean water every flush. Reduce this by placing a 'hippo' in the cistern.
- O Water your garden in the cool of the early morning or evening. This will reduce the amount of water lost to evaporation.
- O Collect rain water in water-butts and use a watering can instead of a hose. If you must use a hosepipe, fit a trigger nozzle to control the flow.
- A Lawns can survive long periods of dry weather if the grass is not cut too short. Even if the grass turns brown, it will quickly recover after a few days of rain.

SAVE WATER WITH A HIPPO



Hippo the Water Saver is the simple, proven and low cost water saving device to help

conserve water in toilet cisterns. The typical family uses 70% of their water in the bathroom, with toilet flushing accounting for 30% of the household water use. Every time a toilet is flushed the Hippo not only saves up to 3 litres of water, but it will also reduce your carbon footprint and save you money.

The carbon footprint of unheated water is relatively small, around 0.003 kg per litre. However over time and multiplied by millions of households, the savings can be quite significant.

There are estimated to be in excess of 45 million toilets in the UK, using 2 billion litres of water every day and only around a tenth of these are water-efficient models using 6 litres of water or less. The average toilet uses around 9 litres of water per flush and 1.64 kg CO2 would be saved per year by fitting a Hippo the Water Saver.

Collectively in the UK this could save around 600 million litres if water a day and over 65 million kg (or 65,000 tonnes) of CO2 each year (source - green thing wiki).

We probably all use water without considering the carbon emmissions associated with its supply, disposal and heating. Staggering as it may seem, this accounts for five percent of the UK's carbon emissions and equals that of all UK aviation traffic.

Waterwise's research showed that the energy used to pump, treat and heat the water in the average family home in one year produces the carbon equivalent of a return flight from London to New York.

Many toilets will flush just as effectively with less water. By putting Hippos into your cisterns you can reduce the amount flushed away and for those on a metered supply this means a significant and sustained saving on water and your water bills.

Search for water hippos on the web. If you can't get one, ask the Rector to take a look.
