Please remember Timothy and the Choir in your prayers as they work to fill the "gap" created by a long interregnum, and also offer thanks to God for all those who helped us out over past months.


Music is such an important part of the liturgy, and like all aspects of worship, it is carried out *Ad Maiorem Dei Gloriam*—"To the greater glory of God."



Now this is the Living Bible

His name is Bill. He has wild hair, wears a T-shit with holes in it, jeans, and no shoes. This was literally his wardrobe for his entire four years of college. He is brilliant. He I kind of profound and very, very bright. He became a Christian while attending college.

Across the street from the campus is a well-dressed, very conservative church. They want to develop a ministry to the students but are not sure how to go about it. One day Bill decides to go there. He walk in with his jeans, his T-shirt, his wild hair, and no shoes. The service has already started, so Bill moves down the aisle, looking for a seat. The church is completely packed and he can't find a seat. By now, people are looking a bit uncomfortable, but no one says anything.

Bill gets closer and closer to the chancel. When he realises there are no seats he just squats down right on the carpet. By now people are really uptight, and the tension in the air is thick.

About this time the Rector realises that from away at the back of the church a warden is slowly making his way toward Bill. Now the warden is in his eighties, has silver hair, and is wearing a three-piece suit. He is a godly man—very elegant, very dignified, very courtly. He walks with a stick. As he starts walking toward this boy, everyone is saying to themselves that you can't blame him for what he is going to do.

How can you expect a man of his ag and of his background to understand some college kid on the floor? It takes a long time for the man to reach the boy. The church is utterly silent, except for the clicking of the man's stick. All eyes are focused on him. The Rector can't even preach the sermon until the warden does what he has to do.. When the warden finally reaches Bill, the church watches as the elderly man drops his stick to the floor. With great difficulty he lowers himself and sits down next to Bill and worships with him so that he won't be alone. Everyone chokes up with emotion.

When the Rector gains control he says, "What I'm about to preach, you will never remember. What you have just seen, you will never forget."

Be careful how you live. You may be the only Bible some people will ever read.

How do you see God?

We all carry round with us a picture of God: a picture in the mind. This picture can have a profound effect on our attitude to ourselves, to our lives, to other people and to our faith. So it is important that our picture of God is not misleading. Jesus reveals God to us. But do we take him at his word? This questionnaire will help you discover your own picture of God.

- 1. Do you think God loves you? YES/NO
- Do you think you have to be holy before God will love you? YES/NO
- 3. Do you think God wants you to despise yourself? YES/NO
- 4. Do you think God wants you to be happy in this life? YES/NO
- 5. Do you think God is ready to forgive any sin you may commit?
- 6. YES/NO
- 7. Do you think that, more often than not, God is angry with you? YES/NO
- Do you think God finds you a wonderful and fascinating person? YES/NO
- If something bad happens to you, do you think God must be displeased with you? YES/NO
- Do you think your life on earth is a test to see if you will keep God's law? YES/NO
- 11. Do you think God listens to your prayers? YES/NO

For questions 1,4,5,7,10 score 2 points for every YES answer and none for every NO answer.

For questions 2,3,6,8,9 score 2 for every NO answer and none for every YES answer.

The higher your score, the more your image of God is in tune with hat revealed by Jesus.

A score of less than 8 suggests that you need to attend more closely to the words of Jesus in the Gospel accounts and understand that he shows us in his life what God is like.

FAIR LINEN TO CELEBRATE EASTER

When you go out to dinner at a restaurant or to friends, how do you feel when you see the eating area? If everything is clean, shiny bright and arranged neatly, do you get a good feeling of expectation?



Well, it's just the same at church on a Sunday morning when we come to a Holy Communion service—especially the one on Easter Day! When you enter and look towards the Holy Table it should be ready, attractive, and give you that eager feeling. God is here. Today you will receive him in bread and wine — whether that is by reality or in remembrance—or by a blessing. What an amazing thought!

The Holy Table will have been carefully prepared for this very special occasion. Some churches, just like our own, will cover the front of the table with a coloured frontal to reflect the Church's season. But on top of the table will be laid a white 'fair linen' cloth.

The fair linen symbolises the burial cloth of Jesus and normally extends the whole width of the table and down both sides. The fair linen should be plain with only five flat crosses embroidered on it, to remind the worshippers of the five wounds that Christ received for us. These are usually sewn in white, so they do not contrast, and are placed on the top of the table, in the four corners and in the centre.

The fair linen cloth is always kept 'spotless'; if it becomes soiled, even just a little, it is taken off and laundered. The fair linen cloth is left on the Holy Table for services other that Holy Communion, but for these it is covered with another cloth called a 'dust cover'.

In order to keep it spotless and without creases, the fair linen cloth is always rolled after laundering rather than folded.

How to handle Temptation

"I can resist everything but temptation" (Oscar Wilde). During Lent we remember our Lord's experience in the wilderness (Matthew 4:1-11), when 'He was led by the Spirit.. to be tempted by the devil.' (1). Temptation is a test of obedience, whether we do things our way or God's way. After 40 days of fasting Jesus was tired, hungry and vulnerable. Like Him, the Devil will attack us at our most vulnerable moments, especially during this pandemic.

The first temptation was to turn stones into bread:

Jesus' ministry was not about meeting His own needs, but being nourished by God's Word. 'We do not live by bread alone but by every word that comes from the mouth of God' (Deuteronomy 8:3). Like Jesus, we are called to make God our priority and trust Him completely.

The second temptation was to put God to the test:

Jumping off the Temple pinna-

cle would have been a dramatic way for Jesus to gain popularity, but this is not God's way! 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.' (Deuteronomy 6:16). We too need to learn this lesson!

The third temptation was to worship Satan:

Finally, the devil took Jesus to a mountain to offer Him worldly power. In contrast, His calling as Messiah was marked by suffering and honouring God. 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve Him only' (Deuteronomy 6:13). This is often our experience in living for God.

Jesus stands with us in our temptations. As we claim the promises of Scripture, we will find strength in the power of the Spirit and the victory of the Cross.

First is **CHRONIC COMPLAINER.** He is silent only when the church is idle.

His able lieutenant is **EVER OFFENDED**. Disagree with him and he'll take his toys and go home.

Their capable assistant is **AVID ADVISOR**. No matter how hard you try or how well you do, he will always tell you how you could have done better.

Then there is **CHURCH JUMPER**. He is always sure that somewhere there is a perfect church where everyone and everything is in complete harmony. If he finds a church like that, let's hope he doesn't join it; he might spoil it!



WHY SHOULD CHRISTIANS CARE ABOUT THE JEWS?



Jesus said, "Salvation is from the Jews." (St John 4:22). Do you believe it? Well, Jesus said it, so perhaps you should give it some thought! The Christian Church in general has a habit of taking the salvation and ignoring the Jews!

God tells us that he has an eternal covenant with the Jewish people. In other words, he has entered into a special relationship with them, and it lasts for ever. Christians are also in a relationship with God. So if we are in a relationship with God, it follows that we are in a relationship with the Jewish people as well. But what kind of relationship is it?

A thousand years before Christianity began, the Jewish people were witnesses to the power of a God who saved them from slavery in Egypt by delivering them, and so to the present day they remain living witnesses to God's grace and power.

Everything we know about God comes to us through the Jews. But for hundreds of years they have been persecuted throughout the world. In the 1200s they were expelled from England and Spain, and then within living memory there was the Holocaust.

Although in many parts of the world Christian people have woken up to the results of centuries of hostility towards the Jews, anti-Semitism is still rife in the general populace. So isn't it time we started to care about the Jews?

The Bible can help us make up our minds.

Just what does the Bible say that might help us in this respect?



God loves all people and desires them to be saved by believing in Jesus. [1Timothy2:3]

God shows no favouritism, but has chosen the Jewish people for a distinct purpose and reason. [Romans 2:11, Deuteronomy 14:2]

God's plans for the Jews did not end when Jesus came; they continue today. [Romans 11:1-2]



God consistently preserves Israel. [Malachi 3:6]

There are many promises about Israel, including their national return to their land. [Ezekiel36, Deuteronomy 30, Isaiah 11, Amos 9, Jeremiah 16].

Friends and enemies of the Jews.

The Book of Joshua tells us of a Gentile friend of the Jews. She is Rahab the prostitute, who certainly believed that the land (then known as Canaan) had been given to the Jews by God. She says "I know the Lord has given this land to you." [Joshua 2:9].



A centurion mentioned by St Luke was also a Gentile friend of the Jews. He showed his love for the Jewish people by building a synagogue for them, and through other practical action. Jesus says about him, I tell you, I have not found such great faith, even in Israel." [St Luke 7:9].

A Gentile enemy of the Jews in the Bible is Haman, who planned to destroy them. There are other New Testament enemies of the Jewish nation, including Alexander [Acts 19:34].

But what about the Arabs?

As well as making certain promises with Isaac, the ancestor of the Jews, God also made promises to Ishmael, the ancestor of the Arabs. The promises were similar, but the promise of the land was to Israel only.

The descendants of Isaac and Ishmael have lived together for many hundreds of years, and it is really only in recent times that enmity has arisen. But God's purpose for the whole region is that the people should live together in peace.



This peace between Jew and Arab is foretold by Isaiah, when the Jews and the Arabs will be a blessing on the earth. All Christians are invited to pray for this reconciliation in Jesus.

In that day there will be a highway from Egypt to Assyria and Assyria will come into Egypt, and Egypt into Assyria, and the Egyptians will worship with the Assyrians.

In that day Israel will be the third with Egypt and Assyria, a blessing on the earth, who the Lord of Hosts has blessed, saying, 'Blessed be Egypt my people, and Assyria the work of my hands, and Israel my inheritance.' [Isaiah 19:23-25]



HOW TO BUILD A GREAT CHURCH

It takes very little planning to wreck a building or a business, but it takes skilful planning and diligent work to build.

It is easy to kill a church, but it takes thought and persistence to build up one that is a great witness to Jesus Christ. The successful churches in this respect did not just happen; they have been built through persistent effort. Here are just a few suggestions for building a successful church.

- 1. Never allow a day to pass without taking time to pray for your church and its ministry.
- 2. Never speak to anyone without praising your Rector and Select Vestry. The criticism will be spoken loud and often; see that the praise is louder.
- 3. Never fail to be friendly to anyone in all services, especially to newcomers and absentees. Nothing in the world can substitute for old-fashioned friendliness.
- 4. Never make your church of less importance than social engagements, secular meetings, or anything else. There is no greater power for a church than that of members who quietly but emphatically put it first.
- 5. Never refuse an opportunity to serve. Be willing to serve in whatever way you are asked. All service ranks the same with God.
- 6. Attend church every Sunday.
