What a busy two-month period this is turning out to be!

The first day of Lent (Ash Wednesday) will be marked by Holy Communion, as we begin our period of spiritual renewal together.

Please note our **Lenten Lunchtimes** on most of the Wednesdays of Lent, when we will be treated to a short recital by our Organist Timothy Wilson, followed by a Homily (very short sermon), and then a simple lunch together in the hall.

Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday, when Alan McLeod's donkey will help us to re-enact our Lord's Palm Sunday procession from the little hamlet of Bethphage, over the hill and into Jerusalem. There will be changes due to Coronavirus.

We observe the rest of Holy Week each evening at 8.00 when we join together in church for **Compline**. On **Maundy Thursday** we celebrate the Holy Communion and then observe the traditions of that day, as we prepare the church for Good Friday. The service on **Good Friday** evening is a simple devotion, and then on Easter Day we celebrate the joyful **Holy Communion** of the Feast of the Resurrection.

IN PRAISE OF PLODDERS

Consider the words of the apostle Paul where he says, 'I press on towards the goal' (*Philippians 3:14*). It suggests taking one step at a time, and simply keeping moving in the right direction with discipline and determination.

This reminds us of the great Bible translator William Carey who said of himself, "If he gives me credit for being a plodder, he will describe me justly.

Anything beyond that will be too much. I can plod. I can persevere in any definite pursuit. To this I owe everything."

Christian discipleship is not always exciting, glamorous, or even enjoyable. Sometimes it is a matter of quietly getting on with it, with our eyes fixed on Jesus. Think about it!

THE CHRISTIAN FAITH OF DENZEL WASHINGTON



The American actor Denzel Washington, 66, mentioned his Christian faith in a recent interview with the New York Times.

Washington described himself as God-fearing and warned against the dangers of the digital age. He said: "The Bible says in the last days ... we'll be lovers of ourselves. The No. 1 photograph today is a selfie, 'Oh, me at the protest.' 'Follow me.' 'Listen to me.'...We're living in a time where people are willing to do


anything to get followed."


NYT Journalist Maureen Dowd said that during the interview, Washington encouraged her to read the Bible. He said: "You have to fill up that bucket every morning. It's rough out there." He went on: "If you don't have a spiritual anchor you'll be easily blown by the wind and you'll be led to depression."

Speaking recently at The Better Man Event conference in Florida, Washington said: "I hope that the words in my mouth and the meditation of my heart are pleasing in God's sight, but I'm human. I'm just like you... If you want to talk to someone, talk to the One that can do something about it."

Washington also said that before his 97-year-old mother died last year, he promised her he would "attempt to honour her and God by living the rest of my days in a way that would make her proud."

Washington has been married to Paulette Pearson for 38 years. With Archbishop Desmond Tutu officiating, he and his wife renewed their wedding vows in 1995 in South Africa.













Here is a way in which we can all play a valuable role in God's work. Will you take up the challenge?

Pray for our parish and all its people, that through our public worship we may be awakened to the wonder of God's love for us.

Pray that more and more of our people may see the necessity of weekly worship in church with their Christian brothers and sisters.

<u>Pray that our worship may constantly undergo renewal</u>, and that it may never become mere ceremonial observance.

<u>Pray for our Rector,</u> who has the cure of souls in the parish, and who requires your prayers in order to adequately perform his role.

Pray for all those who lead the worship, especially the Rector and David Holmes, that through their own preparation for the task, and in the way which they perform it, they may encourage all our people to worship in spirit and in truth.

Pray for those who take lightly our Lord's command to partake of the Sacrament of Holy Communion, and ask that ways may be found to show the importance of participation in this respect.

Pray for Timothy our Organist, and the Choir, that they may always be aware of their high calling, and give of their very best at all times.

Pray that we may be a truly friendly and welcoming parish family, and that no visitor or stranger in church may ever feel alienated or ignored.

Pray for George our Bishop, living in our parish, that he may have strength to manage the daily problems of parishes and people. Pray for his wife Nadine and his children in their daily lives, and in the role to which God has called them all.

Pray for all those who have the care of our young people, especially parents, godparents and guardians. Pray that they may be given strength and motivation to keep the promises made at the baptism of their children, to bring them up in the Christian faith by their prayers, teaching and example.

Pray for the parish Sunday

School, and for teachers Eleanor, Ashley and Angela. Pray that the children may be eager to learn, and the teachers eager to teach the things of God.

<u>Pray for God's guidance</u> as to how he wants our parish to further develop.

Pray that those whom God is calling to work with the young may be open to the promptings of the Holy Spirit and offer their services in love and sacrifice.

Ask God's special blessing on those families which are broken and divided, and pray that their members may still be united in the family of our parish.

Remember those who live alone, both senior citizens and younger people, that they too may feel part of the family of God in the Parish of Kilbride, and share the love of a family.

Ask God's continued blessings on the development of the Healing Ministry within our parish family, that more people may realise the important role they can play by praying for those who are ill, especially together in church once a month.

Pray for the vital work of Environmental Stewardship which exists within the parish, that we may willingly adhere to the principles of our Environmental Policy and encourage others to join the cause.

Thank God for all in Holy Orders who have served our parish in times past, and especially for the Revd Paul Redfern, the Revd Colin Hall-Thompson, the Revd Clyde Irvine, and the Revd Roy Cox, former rectors of our parish.



Pray for a greater sense of peace in our land, and for an end of hatred and sectarianism.

Ask God how we, <u>as individuals</u> and as a parish, can best make our contribution permanent and lasting peace, and a greater understanding of our beliefs and cultures.

Ask forgiveness for our part in the bitterness of our society, and pray for the visible unity of the whole Christian Church, which we know to be our Lord's will.

Pray for other churches within our parish; the congregation at Kilbride Presbyterian Church and at Doagh Methodist Church, and the Christian group meeting in the Torrens Hall.

Pray for local councillors, other local leaders, and all who have a voice in the community, that words may never be spoken hastily or without thought.

Pray for the members of the PSNI, that they may always work for a greater sense of trust with the public.

Pray for the members of the security forces, magistrates, and all connected with Law and Order.

<u>Pray for all MLAs</u> and all who represent our people in public office.

<u>Pray for the love of Christ</u> in the hearts of all our people.


Will we be able to fit everyone in according to the restrictions? We think so.

WILLIAM HARPER Obiit January 2022

The Herald does not normally contain obituaries, but William was a Diocesan Reader in the Church of Ireland for a large part of his life, and we would all feel it appropriate that he be mentioned in these pages.

William's recent funeral service was attended by many people, including The Revd Paul Redfern and The Very Revd John Bond, formerly Dean of Connor, both of whom played a part in the service, as was William's wish.



Brought up in the Choir of the Cathedral Church of St Columb, Derry, William was an excellent churchman, who served God and the people in accordance with his sincerity and dedication.

When William finally retired from assisting at public worship in St Bride's, the parish awarded him the title of *Reader Emeritus* in honour of a lifetime's work in the Church.

We at St Bride's will miss him with his thoroughly good and honest nature and demonstration of the Faith. We extend our condolences to William's daughters, to Mark, formerly an organist at St Bride's, and to all the family. *Requiescat in pace*.

A BOOK OF MEMORY FOR KILBRIDE

It might be a good idea if we could give a little more time to thanking God for the great many souls who have worked long and hard in the service of Christ and the parish.

Of course, we can't go back too far into the long history of our parish, because no one will remember that far back!

It might help, though, if we were to compile a "Book of Memory" containing the names of those who lived and worked for our church from, say the end of the Second World War.

The names of many will be recorded in the registers of baptisms, weddings and funerals, and there will be names of others recorded in books, files and papers stored in our parish archive.

While some of these names will be "remembered in history", other names will exist in records, but will not be remembered. Should this book, therefore, contain the names of, for example, those who were baptised, but who never darkened the door of the church?

Yes, they should. It is not for us



to decide who should be recorded and not recorded in the Book. If they existed and were connected with the parish, their names should certainly be recorded.

But what if someone remembers the name of a person who they say was a parishioner for a while, then moved away and died?

That would have to be investigated very carefully; only the names of *deceased* persons should be recorded in the book.

So you see, it can be quite a complicated project to complete, but we can do it!

Remember, the purpose of the book will be to give thanks to Almighty God for the labours of these former parishioners who lived and died in the service of Christ and the parish.

Members of the Select Vestry have recently decided that this project should be commenced.

At a certain stage, everyone will be given the chance to put

forward names for the book. The information should be considered carefully, with dates of death. The information you give will be scrutinized before the names are included.

The project may take some years to complete, but by the end of the work we should have a very valuable memory of a large number of people.

You will be kept informed, from time to time, in church, as to how the project is developing.

A DAY WITH GOD

At the time of going to print our special Day of Prayer has not yet taken place.

However, in the next edition of the Herald we hope to present some of the reactions of those who took part in the project.

Thank you to all who made the effort to involve themselves in this very important part of parish life.

DURING THE PANDEMIC

A new report detailing how clergy have fared in the Covid pandemic has been published, as part of the findings from the Church's *Living Ministry* research programme.

The report sets out how clergy have reported on their levels of physical, mental, spiritual, relational and financial wellbeing during the pandemic. The study also reports on respondents' perspectives



relating to autonomy, accountability and support.

Dr Liz Graveling, who oversees the research programme, said: "It will be of little surprise that the biggest impacts on wellbeing were in the areas of mental health and relationships. However, ... strong connections with other people were crucial to clergy wellbeing before as well as during the pandemic."

THE QUEEN

When the Queen is on holiday at Balmoral she invites a clergyman to spend time with her family. Her trust in the Lord is central to her in so many aspects of her life.

We will have much more on the Queen in the next edition of The Herald, which will cover the period of celebration regarding the Platinum Jubilee.





ECO CORNER

SAVING THE PLANET VIA KITCHEN AND BATHROOM

As world leaders wake up to the crisis of global warming and plan emergency measures before it is too late, each of us can make a difference right now, beginning in our own homes.

Start in the KITCHEN

25% of the world's food is thrown away. One supermarket discovered British households waste seven million tonnes of food waste every year, partly because most of our fridges aren't cold enough. Keeping the fridge temperature at a maximum of 4 degrees will help food last longer and save waste.

Vast quantities of greenhouse gases are released by animals reared to supply us with red meat and dairy products. Cutting down on quantities and conserving leftovers would help.

Conserving electricity by washing clothes at 30 degrees and replacing power-hungry tumble driers with a clothes line or old-fashioned clothes-horse would have the added advantage of reducing soaring power bills.

According to the Good Housekeeping Institute, "many mainstream detergents are brimming with synthetic chemicals like phosphates, chlorine and bleach that pollute our waterways, damaging delicate ecosystems, and may irritate sensitive skin."

Plant-based and eco-friendly alternatives are now readily available and work well in the washing machine and dishwasher.

But there's more...

Don't forget the BATHROOM

Annual increases in UK water consumption would be curbed, if we were to shower rather than bath. Exchanging the shower head for a water-saving type, which regulates or aerates the flow, would save both water and cash.

Spending less time in the shower needn't be a hardship. Daily shampooing may actually be counter-productive - it's best to let some oils remain in the hair, so they can act as moisturisers. Biodegradable body wash is available in bulk, from which reusable containers can be filled.

Eco-friendly toothpaste is now on the market, some of it in plastic-free containers. More water can be saved by turning the tap off as we brush. Beware wet-wipes which may be 'flushable', but aren't biodegradable, because they are part-plastic. Eco-friendly alternatives are now available. Saving the planet needn't cost the earth!

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

This year the World Day of Prayer Service is due to be held in 2nd Donegore Presbyterian Church on Friday 4th March at 8pm. The Service has been prepared by the Christian women of England, Wales and Northern Ireland with the theme "I know the plans I have for you" which is found in the Book of the Prophet Jeremiah. The service will focus on freedom, forgiveness, justice and God's peace.

WHY THE CROSS?

The cross is a picture of violence, yet the key to peace;

a picture of suffering, yet the key to healing;

a picture of death, yet the key to life;

a picture of utter weakness, yet the key to power;

a picture of capital punishment, yet the key to mercy and forgiveness;

a picture of vicious hatred, yet the key to love;

a picture of supreme shame, yet the Christian's supreme boast.

The cross really is the key to everything! Although a horrifying instrument of torture and death, it is also a symbol of love and peace. On the cross Jesus died to deal with the problem of our sin and defeat the powers of death and evil. He identified with our sufferings and set us an example of self-sacrificial love.

As Peter writes, 'He Himself bore our sins in His body on the tree, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; by His wounds you have been healed ... Christ died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God' (1 Peter 2:24, 3:18). Jesus died in our place on the cross and took away our guilt, to pay the full penalty for our sin. Access to God's presence is now open to all, symbolised by the Temple curtain being torn in two from top to bottom. The barrier between us and God was torn down in order 'to bring us to God'.

Jesus is the bridge providing access between us and God. 'If Jesus Christ is to be our Saviour then He must be able to place a hand upon a pardoning God and another hand on a penitent sinner and draw them together in an act of reconciliation' (Bishop Handley Moule).
