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## MOTHERS' DAY OR MOTHERING SUNDAY?

On $19^{\text {th }}$ March most churches will celebrate their 'mothers'. £millions will be spent on Mother's Day gifts and cards, and children will give flowers to women in church. It's a joy to honour mothers for their love and caring, but our blessings are lessened when we forget the Day's original purpose.


The Mother's Day we know today began on $12^{\text {th }}$ May, 1907, in America, when a woman called Anna Jarvis held a service in her late mother's church to honour her work of organising women's groups to promote friendship and health. The idea spread, and in 1914 Mother's Day was declared an official celebration.

But the European Mothering Sunday goes back to the 16th century, and was altogether more faith-based. On the fourth Sunday of Lent people went 'a-mothering', going to their 'mother' church, the main church in the region, for a special service. In those days domestic servants rarely had free days, but they were given a day off during Lent, so they could go along with their mothers and families.

Times changed, and by the 1900 s Mothering Sunday had largely changed into Mother's Day - a celebration of mothers more than mother churches.

Many Scriptures describe the mothering qualities of God, for example Isaiah 66:13 - 'As a mother comforts her child, so will I comfort you.' We also see it in women without children. I remember a spinster head teacher in a poor district in Wales mothering and bringing the best out of 'her' children. We see it in our housing and care homes, in older women who have never been mothers as well as those who have, as they comfort a carer who has had a miscarriage, or who needs encouragement.

We see it in pastors, and in men who nurture others. Let's thank God for His gift of 'mothering', wherever we find it.

## HOLOCAUST VICTIMS REMEMBERED AT KILBRIDE



> Holocaust Memorial Day was 27 January, but in recent years in Kilbride Parish Church it has been observed on the nearest Sunday to that date.

During the service of Morning Prayer this year, a very informative talk was given jointly by the Rector and parish reader David Holmes. Together they described the events leading up to the Holocaust, why Jewish people and other groups were targeted for humiliation, discrimination and eventual extermination by Hitler and the German Third Reich.

The events of the Nuremberg trials were described when many of the people who perpetrated these atrocities were held to account with many being executed. In the aftermath of the war Jewish people were still viewed with suspicion by many nations and Jewish refugees were shunned by many including Britain.

Other genocides in the years since were remembered and prayers offered that they should never happen again. The commemoration ended with the lighting of six candles representing the six million Jews who died in the Holocaust.

## ALL IN THE MONTH OF MARCH

It was:
300 years ago, on $8^{\text {th }}$ March 1723 that Sir Christopher Wren, English architect, died. Best known for designing St Paul's Cathedral.

100 years ago, on $4^{\text {th }}$ March 1923 that Patrick Moore, the amateur astronomer, TV presenter, writer and musician was born. Best known for presenting the TV astronomy show The Sky at Night for over 50 years. (Died 2012)

80 years ago, on $13^{\text {th }}$ March 1943 that the final liquidation of Krakow Ghetto in Poland took place. 8,000 Jews were transported to Plaszow labour camp, 2000 more were simply killed in the streets, and the rest were sent to Auschwitz.

Also 70 years ago, on $26^{\text {th }}$ March 1953 that Dr Jonas Salk announced that he had completed the first small-scale test of a polio vaccine. Larger tests began in February 1954, and mass vaccinations began in April 1955.

65 years ago, on $2^{\text {nd }}$ March 1958 that the first land crossing of Antarctica was completed by the Commonwealth Trans-Antarctic Expedition, led by Vivian Fuchs. The team of 12 men travelled 2,158 miles from Shackleton Base to Scott Base (via the South Pole) in 99 days, using six vehicles.

60 years ago, on $22^{\text {nd }}$ March 1963 that the British Secretary of State for War, John Profumo, made a statement in the House of Commons in which he denied there was any impropriety in his relationship with Christine Keeler, a model who was also in a sexual relationship with a drug dealer and a Soviet naval attaché. (In June he admitted he had lied, and resigned.)

50 years ago, on $8^{\text {th }}$ March 1973 that the citizens of Northern Ireland voted in a referendum to remain within the United Kingdom. That same day the IRA carried out its first bombing in Britain since WWII, planting car bombs in London. One person died, 200 were injured.

## WATCHMEN UNDETERRED BY HEAVY SNOW

The Watchmen held fast to their January appointment at St Bride's when eight loyal and steadfast members turned up amidst the ice and snow of a foul evening to hear David Holmes give an illustrated talk on the Revd Parker E Major, sometime Rector of this parish for a period of forty years.

David's talk was well worth the effort made to get to the Parish Room, and a cup of tea on arrival soon warmed everyone up to a satisfactory standard.

The excellent delivery by our parish reader generated much discussion, and members were astounded by the volume of information that David produced. When the Revd Parker Major was instituted to Kilbride there was no rectory, so he lived in accommodation in Fisherwick Lodge while a satisfactory building was erected on a site at what became Rectory Road. Mr Major lived there with his wife and housekeeper.


The pulpit in church is dedicated to the Revd Parker Major, and a brass plaque attached to the base can still be seen. Located on a wall in the vestry is another plaque, bearing the words of a thanksgiving speech addressed to him on his retirement due to ill health.

This talk by David Holmes was a most interesting and enthralling delivery for the Watchmen's first meeting of 2023. Thanks, David, for the great effort involved!

# TIME FOR SOME GOOD NEWS? 

If you can't bear to watch or read the news, you're not alone.
Newly published research shows that more than seven out of ten news publishers are concerned about increasing levels of 'news avoidance.'

More and more people are turning away from the news because it's just too difficult to take. And that may present an opportunity for Christians to present our life-giving gospel message.

The Reuters Institute for the Study of Journalism has published its 'Journalism, media, and technology trends and predictions 2023' report, based on a wide-ranging survey of 303 news leaders in 53 countries. It explores the latest developments in journalism and the priorities for the year ahead.

One area of deep concern was increasing levels of 'news avoidance' with 72 per cent of publishers worried about the phenome-

non. Many readers and viewers were avoiding news, especially, says the report "around important but often depressing topics like Ukraine and climate change."

Does this widespread 'news avoidance' have any messages for the Church and for Christians generally? Well, maybe two.

The first is for ourselves. How guilty are we of scrolling past bad news on our social media feed, switching off the TV or radio, or pausing a podcast when the subject matter becomes tough to take? That's tempting to do, but it's important for Christians to be aware of events and trends across the globe, to enable us to pray intelligently, and to be able to support organisations and people working to make the world a better place.

The second is about how we present our gospel message. We have 'good news' to proclaim, while we are living in a time when people are turning away from news of any kind, seeking instead to look for entertainment and distraction. In our preaching, in our personal testimonies and in the wide range of ways that we communicate the gospel message of 'abundant life' through Jesus Christ, we are called to be positive and upbeat.

In a world that is turning away from bad news, we have good news to offer. Our mission is to present this good news in ways that can catch the attention of a distracted world that's tired of the gloom and looking for something better.
