

Rev. Canon David Humphries Retires



The morning service of Morning Prayer on 20th August was the last service for our Rector before he retired on 31st August after almost seven years as Rector of Kilbride Parish Church. It was a normal service of Morning Prayer but many visitors from other churches and organisations came to wish him well. Representatives from Antrim and Newtownabbey Council, Ballyclare Victoria Flute Band, various Masonic lodges and many personal friends came to show their respect and wish him well in his retirement. To mark the occasion a collection had

been made and a gift cheque was presented to David by Ivan Topping, Secretary of the Select Vestry. Ivan paid tribute to the wonderful service that David has given to Kilbride during his time as incumbent, also mentioning his work outside of the parish with the organ scholarship scheme and in particular his leadership of a number of pilgrimages to the Holy Land during his time at Kilbride, the last one being in May of this year accompanied by Bishop George Davison. David has led more than twenty five pilgrimages to the Holy Land during more than three

decades of ministry. On behalf of the members of the Select Vestry and the parishioners of Kilbride Ivan thanked David for his ministry and wished him a long and productive retirement. David Holmes then paid a personal tribute to the Rector for the help he had given him in his role as Parish Reader for Kilbride and presented him with a photo-book containing photographs taken during the Rector's ministry. The church choir

sang an anthem entitled 'A Clare Benediction' written by John Rutter. Following the service everyone enjoyed refreshments in the Parish Hall where they were able to chat with David and offer their own personal tributes and good wishes to him as they said goodbye. On behalf of the church wardens during David's time in Kilbride Iris McCormick read a poem she had written about David.

Poppy Display

Can you knit or crochet?

Fiona Charlton is organising a display of poppies for inside the Church this November and will needs lots of knitted or crocheted poppies. If you are interested in helping create the display, there will be flyers circulating which will include two knitting patterns and a crochet pattern. If you have a pattern of your own that you would prefer to use that is also ok. Finished poppies should be about 4 inches across and will be arranged together to create an impressive display for Remembrance Sunday.

The patterns include instructions for making standard red poppies, however poppies can also be knit or crocheted in purple to commemorate the animals from the wars. Finished poppies can be given to Fiona at any time, however ideally she would need them by the end of September so that the display can be assembled.


History of Hymns

This is a new section in The Herald where the history of some of our well-loved hymns will be explored.

Given it is now the season of the year for harvesting God's bounty the first hymn featured is 'We plough the fields and scatter' which has been popular with many generations of worshippers. 'We plough the fields and scatter' has its origins in Germany originally being a poem written by Matthias Claudius (1740 - 1815). As a young man Claudius had turned his back on Christianity but in 1877 he became ill. During this period of illness he renewed his faith and was inspired to write a number of Christian poems. In 1782, and following a dinner invitation from a friend who asked him to bring one of his Christian poems with him, Claudius wrote a new poem for the occasion. He gave it the title 'Wir

pflügen und wir streuen' and based on Psalm 144 it extended to 17 verses! It was published that same year and was later set to music in 1800, credited to Johann A. P. Schulz. It was then published in various German hymn books but the publishers omitted many of the verses and often decided to start at verse 3, which opened with the words 'Wir pflügen und wir streuen' (translated - 'We plough and we scatter).'

Its translation into English followed some years later as an Anglican rector's daughter called Jane Montgomery Campbell (1817 - 1878), from London, had been translating many German hymns into English. Jane was a singing teacher and a poet in her own right, but she was also a gifted linguist and German scholar. As she worked on this hymn she didn't





use a literal translation of its opening line but adjusted it a little to retain the original feeling that the poet had in mind, that of giving thanks to God for the harvest. On completion she taught it to her pupils in her father's parish school and it and other translations

were later published in Charles Bere's Garland of Songs and Children's Chorale Book. It has also been published in numerous hymn books and has been enjoyed by many in the ensuing 150 years.

Interregnum in Kilbride

You may hear the term 'interregnum' mentioned in Kilbride over the coming months and you may well be puzzled as to its meaning. It's fairly obvious that it's a Latin word, but one that is rarely used in everyday conversations. Many words in our everyday language have Latin origins and indeed Christian services used to be conducted completely in Latin which was fine for the scholars of the day but not so useful for the common people attending church!

Eventually everything was translated into English but with many words still having Latin origins. A strong legacy of Latin usage does still remain in medical and legal circles.

Getting back to this unusual word - is it something we should be anxious about it as it sounds rather ominous? No, as it literally translates to 'between reigns' or 'between offices.'

The dictionary defines an interregnum as the following; "a period when a country or organisation does not have a leader."

A famous interregnum in English history followed the execution of Charles I in 1649 when England was ruled as a commonwealth without an established monarchy. Oliver Cromwell was the leader of the English revolutionary leaders of the

commonwealth who established himself as "Lord Protectorate" over the entire commonwealth. The interregnum ended with the reestablishment of the monarchy in 1660 and the ascension of Charles II to the throne. It has taken another 362 years to have another King Charles as monarch!

What does an interregnum mean in the context of the Parish of Kilbride?

It is the period between the retirement of our former rector. Rev. Canon David Humphries, and the appointment of his successor. The process for finding a replacement rector has already started and a small group of people (four in number), collectively called the Parochial Nominators, has been tasked with identifying and recruiting a new rector. The Parochial Nominators were elected at the last General Vestry a few months ago and they will work very closely with Bishop George to select a suitable person. The process can take some time and each nominator will be extremely busy over the coming months.

Please pray for them, individually and collectively, asking God to give them guidance and to grant them sound judgement in this important task.

Lord, call to this your church and ours a true shepherd, a person of God, a minister of Christ; and make us, with them, a church joyful in worship and united in witness, working, caring, praising, loving, to the glory of your name; through Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen.

Please pray also for our former rector, Rev. Canon David Humphries, as he begins his well-earned retirement after more than three decades in the service of Christ. May he enjoy a long, happy and blessed retirement.

Somme Commemoration Service, 2nd July, 2023

Rev. Canon David Humphries again conducted this annual service in Ballyclare War Memorial Park where he remembered the fallen of this major battle during World War 1. Many men from the Ballyclare area, including

some from our own congregation, died on the first day of battle, 1st July 1916. Wreaths of poppies were laid at the war memorial by local politicians and the Royal British Legion.
